Port Operator DP World Announces \$883M 2015 Profit

Port operator DP World on Thursday announced profits of \$883 million attributable to its owners for 2015, up 30.7 percent from the year before buoyed by its purchase of the Dubai government-linked free-trade zone operator Economic Zones World.

In its results, DP World said its full-year revenues for 2015 were \$3.9 billion, up 16.3 percent compared to revenues of \$3.4 billion in 2014. It recorded \$675 million in profit attributable to its owners in 2014.

DP World, majority-owned by the Dubai government through its Dubai World conglomerate, ranks among the world's largest port operators, with business at 70 marine terminals in 31 countries.

Federal Budget 2016: First steps towards a fairer and more prosperous Canada

OTTAWA - The Canadian Labour Congress responded to today's federal budget announcement with optimism, saying it begins the important work of reinvesting in Canadian communities, creating jobs, addressing children's and seniors' poverty, and repairing the programs and services Canadians rely on.

"This budget is a step in the right direction for our economy, particularly the Employment Insurance improvements, which will make a big difference for unemployed Canadians, and help stimulate the local economies that need it most right now," said Canadian Labour Congress President Hassan Yussuff.

Yussuff also highlighted the government's infrastructure commitments: "I'm pleased to see significant funding for public transit, affordable housing, social infrastructure and green infrastructure. We can look forward to this creating jobs and helping to build communities

across Canada."

In terms of skills training and workforce development, Yussuff noted that the budget contained promising measures, but fell significantly short of what was promised in the government's election platform.

However, Yussuff said he was encouraged to see the government announce significant and long-overdue investments in First Nations communities, including support for education, child care and infrastructure, particularly water and wastewater infrastructure.

"It is inexcusable that in a nation like ours, a critical necessity like clean water is not available to all. I'm very glad to see the government recognize that and commit the funding necessary to end boil water advisories on reserve in five years," Yussuff said.

Finally, Yussuff said he was pleased to see the government's action on both child poverty and seniors' poverty in today's budget.

"Returning the OAS eligibility age to 65 and increasing the Guaranteed Income Supplement for single low-income seniors are important signs that this government believes seniors should not be forced to retire in poverty. The next step on this issue is universal expansion of the Canada Pension Plan," Yussuff added.

Other aspects of the 2016 budget the CLC highlighted include:

The government's budget projections maintain the Conservatives' reduced health care transfers to provinces and territories. The CLC said they are disappointed by that, but hopeful that continued talks between the Health Ministers will result in new, sustained funding for health care that allows our system to meet the needs of our aging population.

An additional \$245 million to welcome and resettle an additional 10,000 Syrian refugees to Canada. The CLC commended the government for this announcement, and pledged to continue unions' support for refugees.

Commitment to a National Early Learning and Child Care Framework, although no immediate investments are promised in the coming year outside of improvements to on-reserve child care facilities. The CLC believes families could have benefited by immediate, modest investments this year, to help provinces and territories begin to address child care access and affordability.

Restoration of the Court Challenges Program, an important service cut by the Conservatives that made financial assistance available to individuals and groups to assert their equality rights in Canada's courts.

Support for the automotive sector and the promotion of food safety. However, the CLC noted that these and many other positive aspects of the budget could be compromised if the government ratifies the Trans-Pacific Partnership.

Unionizing Uber: New front in battle over wildly successful ride-hailing app

Seattle became 1st city in North America to give Uber drivers the right to unionize late last year

There's a four-wheeled workers' revolution spinning through the streets of Seattle that could end up rolling over one of the most profitable business models of the so-called "sharing economy."

Drivers for the ride-hailing service Uber have been given the right to unionize by Seattle city council, the only jurisdiction in North America to do so.

The union drive brings the potential to achieve what regulators in cities around the world, including in Canada, have been mostly ineffective at doing - imposing local rules and labour standards on how Uber relates with its drivers.

"We have no say," Seattle Uber driver Don Creery told CBC News on a recent visit to the city. "We can email the company about issues, but they just get ignored. It seems the company has an agenda to push the prices as low as they can."

MINERS MEMORIAL WEEKEND

The 31st annual Miners Memorial Weekend, presented by the Cumberland Museum and Archives on Vancouver Island, is a celebration of workers and their families and a call for a renewed commitment for safe and healthy workplaces, justice and equity, and bread and roses for all.

The coal mines in Cumberland were some of the most dangerous in Canada, killing over 300 miners in accidents and countless others from work related illnesses. Appalling working conditions compelled miners to organize and connect with unions from across North America and internationally. Organizer Ginger Goodwin was shot and killed near Cumberland on July 27th, 1918, becoming an important symbol for the struggle of workers. His story is the subject of much song, fiery conversation and celebration in the Village.

Miners Memorial Weekend welcomes hundreds from across the West Coast and beyond for a weekend filled with song, camaraderie, learning, food and drink, passionate exchange and respectful remembrance. The diverse program includes workshops and readings, film, grave side vigils, guided tours, pub crawl, dinner with guest speakers, live music and more.

Saturday afternoon participants come together at the Cumberland Cemetery for a special ceremony. Organizations, families or individuals can order a fair trade bouquet for \$100 to be laid in their name on the graves of fallen miners and the families they left behind. All proceeds support museum programming and labour history exhibit development.
